Judges halt sand dune mining

Company must obtain permit, court rules

A WESTERN Cape High Court decision has effectively halted mining operations at two sand dunes in the heart of the Cape

The sand dunes are in the Mitchells Plain suburbs of Westridge and Rocklands. The Rocklands dune is situ-

ated between two schools. The Westridge dune abuts on to a major road, and an informal settlement was built

Two judges ruled on Friday that mining operations could not continue until black empowerment mining firm Maccsand had obtained zoning authorisation under the Western Cape Land Use Planning Ordinance (Lupo), as well as environmental clearance under the National Environmental Management Act (Nema).

The ruling comes after the City of Cape Town challenged the mining right and permit Maccsand obtained from the Department of Minerals and Energy in October 2007 and August 2008 respectively.

The right and permit were awarded to Maccsand in terms of the Minerals and Petroleum

Resources Development Act. The city asked the court interdict Maccsand from mining and prospecting the dunes until it had complied with the terms of Lupo and Nema.

But Maccsand hit back, arguing that once the minister or a delegate had granted a right or permit, no law or authority could veto that.

The minister of mineral resources, a respondent in the case, argued that the act trumped all other legislation, and that the city's interpretation of the process would create administrative chaos.

In a judgment handed down on Friday, Judge Dennis Davis said it was clear that the constitution carved out areas for provinces and municipalities, and did not give national legislation the right to take away the planning function of municipalities.

If Parliament had wanted the act to override legislation such as Lupo, it would have inserted a provision such as "notwithstanding the provision of any other law", Judge Davis said.

He found that Lupo had clear application to the matter. Turning to the dispute relat-

ing to Nema, Judge Davis agreed that environmental authorisation was necessary. He said there was no dispute

that the mining operation would remove 14.67ha of indigenous vegetation.

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Admiral believes military service will curb crime

SA NAVY Chief Vice-Admiral Johannes Mudimu has said that a national youth service could help cure the country's drug and crime problem.

Mudimu was speaking during the passing-out parade of more than 500 naval cadets in Saldanha Bay on Friday. They will from today begin

their specialist training in areas such as weapon warfare, navigation and diving.

Defence Minister Lindiwe Sisulu, who also spoke to the cadets at the parade, is expected to launch a military youth service programme later this year.

Mudimu said that such a service would also address the dire skills shortage in the

SANDF. Last year, the navy admitted that it was battling to run its ships, submarines and other equipment because of a lack of

skilled staff. According to senior naval officers, three quarters of all submariners trained every year leave the navy.

"This programme would definitely fill those gaps," said Mudimu. "The training is good for anyone, but especially for youngsters facing problems and challenges with drugs and crime.'

He said the two-year mili-

tary skills development course, of which the cadets have now completed eight months, had been introduced to hone the skills of the youth and to train them for service in the military.

"This programme has been a great success," he said. "We have many capable young men and women pursuing their careers in the navy, rendering performance of the highest order. But it all started here.'

More than 30 000 applications were received to attend the navy's basic military training course last year. Only 526 were accepted.

Mudimu said 600 would be accepted next year. Sisulu welcomed the cadets

into the military.

"I'm filled with pride," she said, after receiving a guard of honour. "What I saw today was nothing short of a spectacular. I'm proud of these sailors. They have worked hard and can drill and march like the best there is.'

She said the naval base at Saldanha would become the country's main base for her proposed national youth serv-

ice programme. In May, Sisulu told Parliament's defence committee of her plans for two-year military service that would see youngsters gaining valuable skills, while contributing to the greater good of the country.

Man held hours after woman found dead

WITHIN hours of a 21-year-old woman being found strangled, police from Harare in Khavelitsha had her suspected murderer safely behind bars.

It also appeared that the woman, Lihle Ngwendu, had been sexually assaulted.

She was last seen alive leaving a Harare tavern on Friday night with a 22-year-old man, according to police spokesman Colonel Billy Jones.

Jones said that police had been called out after Ngwendu's partially clothed body was found in bushes in Endlovini, Harare, at about 10am on Saturday.

Preliminary investigations

showed she had been sexually assaulted and strangled.

The suspect was arrested that afternoon near his home, also in Endlovini.

Jones said a post-mortem would be performed to confirm Ngwendu's cause of death.

The suspect was expected to appear in the Khayelitsha Magistrate's Court today.

Jones said Mitchells Plain police were also investigating charges of murder relating to a shooting at about 6.30pm on Friday at the Town Centre taxi rank in which two taxi drivers, both aged about 30, were fatally

wounded. Witnesses said they heard a number of shots, then saw a man

with a handgun fleeing the scene on foot.

The two men who died were Msunelo Msengo, 32, of Nyanga, and Zuzukile Jende, 36, of Samora Machel. Jones could not confirm

whether the incident was taxirelated.

Msengo was wounded twice in the stomach.

He died on arrival at the local day hospital. Jende was wounded once in

the left side, and died at the taxi rank. Jones urged anyone with information to call the Mitchells

Plain police.
